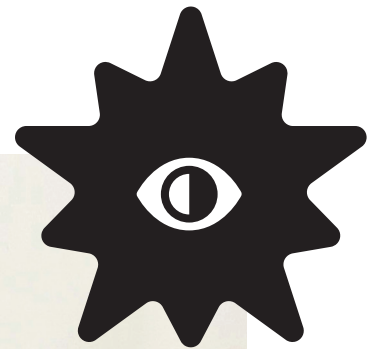

What a journey 2022 has been! Thanks to you, we've empowered even more people living with vision loss by helping them gain the skills and tools they need to achieve their goals.

Last year, we helped 291 people who are blind or visually impaired, along with their loved ones, through engaging programs like arts & culture, recreation, adaptive technology, and independent living.

Of that group, 43 were new to our programs in 2022. Much has been accomplished, yet we will remain determined to prove to those without sight or those losing their sight that they are capable of working, playing, and living life to the fullest.

Finding Confidence & Freedom

Rachael began noticing changes in her vision. She believed her eyes were changing with age...not her cancer diagnoses.

After “things were getting blurrier,” a low-vision specialist recommended she prepare for a future without vision.

As cancer treatments progressed, so did her vision loss, until Rachael had to have her left eye removed and had no vision in her right.

Feeling at her breaking point, Rachael found hope at Outlook Enrichment. “All I heard was, you can do it. We just have to figure out the right way.”

Rachael trained in Adaptive Technology and received adjustment to blindness services to assist with the emotional grieving process.

As she became more confident, she started taking Moby transportation by herself. “It was a big day. I was so proud of myself.”

With new freedom and confidence, Rachael regularly attends our arts program and is active in empowering others through her journey.

Adaptive Technology

Sharing the best tools and applications designed to help people with disabilities gain more independence through assessments, small group class sessions, and one-on-one trainings.

Independent Living

Showing people living with vision loss ways to cook safely, label and organize things, and how to manage time, money, and medication through peer-to-peer interactions online and in-person.

Helping people with vision loss learn the skills they need to participate in the hobbies they love — like attend plays, cheer on favorite sports, be part of a book club, paint, and garden.

of Recreation services were provided in 2022

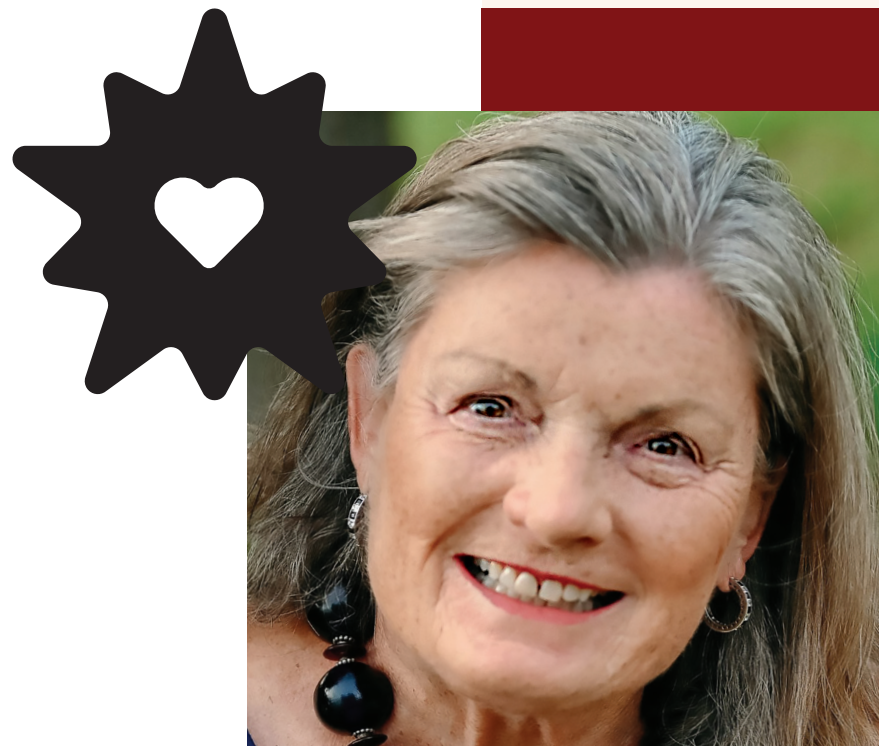
Employment

Jane learned about the possibility of inheriting a genetic eye disease when a family member was diagnosed in 1989.

Her son was the first to experience vision loss due to Leber's Hereditary Optic Neuropathy (LHON) and then...she did too.

Jane's vision loss was a fast progression to now only having the ability to see shadows and tell when it is light or dark.

When Jane was struggling with using her phone, a family friend recommended she reach out to Outlook Enrichment.

Through training, she learned how accessible an iPhone can be and all the mobile applications available for the blind.

She says, “I look at my vision loss as a project. I don't have a choice; I have to keep learning.”

Now Jane looks forward to weekly classes to learn more things like how to access Zoom meetings.

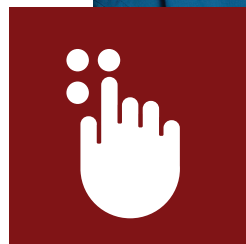
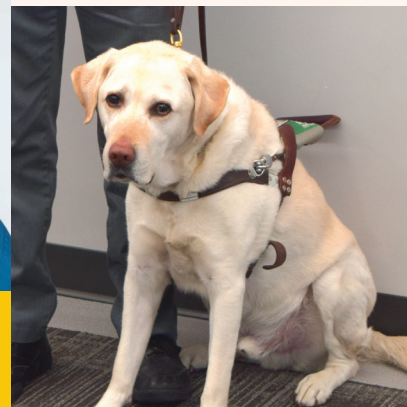
Outlook Enrichment helps Jane move forward and now she gives back to help others on their vision loss journey.

Financial Overview



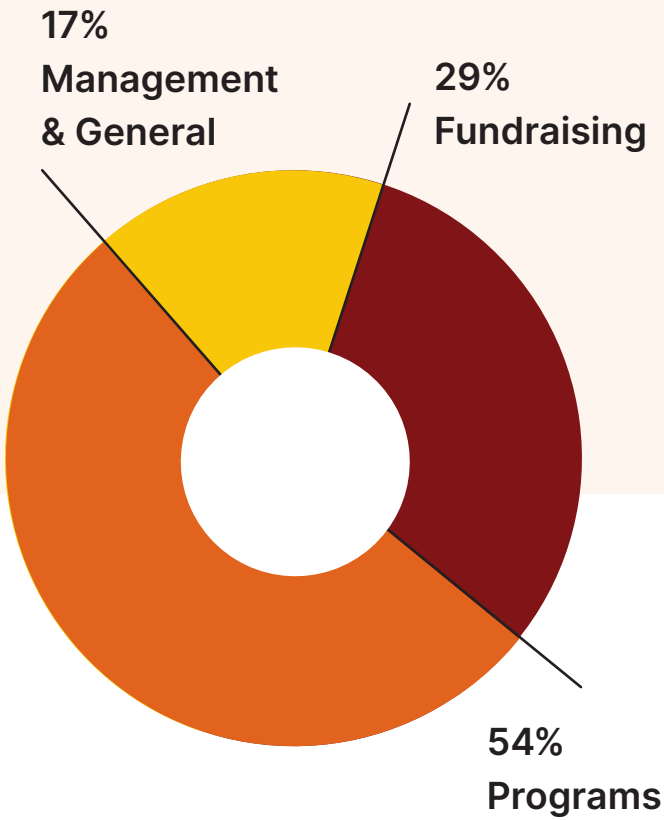
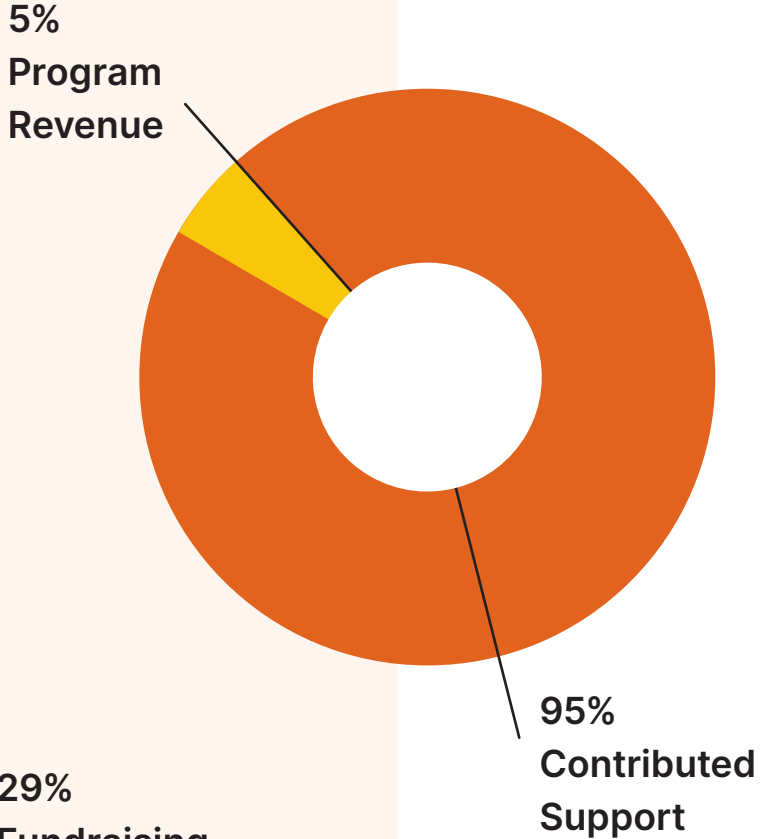
